ESCONDIDO HUMANE SOCIETY NAMES LINDA MARTIN ACTING CEO; PHIL MORGAN ANNOUNCES HIS DEPARTURE JUNE 30, 2005

Escondido, CA March 31, 2005....Phil Morgan, President/CEO of the Escondido Humane Society for seven years, who has seen the organization through some very difficult times, has announced that he is leaving his position at the end of his current contract, says Leslie Anne Mogul, Chair of the Escondido Humane Society (EHS), Board of Directors.

At the same time, Linda Martin, a veteran of 30 years in the human and animal healthcare business, has been named Acting Chief Executive Officer and Vice President of Operations of the Escondido Humane Society.

The Board of Directors will form a search committee to seek the next President and Chief Executive Officer of the Escondido Humane Society, said Mogul. In the interim, Ms. Martin and Gary Neiger, Vice President of Development, will manage daily operations at the EHS.

Commenting on his decision to leave the EHS, Morgan said, "Re-establishing financial stability, regaining the trust of the community and rebuilding after the devastating fire of 2001 were enormous challenges. With the help of the City of Escondido, the community, dedicated volunteers and a truly committed staff, together we have cre-

ated a solid organization and a wonderful new facility. I have reached many of my goals and have grown the organization to its full capacity and the Board of Directors feel it best for new leadership to continue the organization's vision."

"We are extremely fortunate to be able to add Linda Martin's experience to our staff," Mogul said. "We looked for someone who had the knowledge and skills to continue to strengthen our management and staff team to continue to provide the best care and service to animals and pets in our region." Mogul said. "Linda's wide range of expertise will help further improve the efficiency of operations at our shelter."

Martin has been involved in the health care profession for humans and animals for three decades. She received her Bachelor's degree from N.E. Missouri State University in Finance and Management.

During her career Linda has managed multiple veterinary facilities for National PetCare Centers, Inc. She resides in Temecula with her three children and three dogs.

I got a call out of the blue from someone I did not know asking me if I knew anyone who could take in a sweet aged rottweiler who had lost her home due to an eviction. At the time my husband and I had no intention of getting another dog. We lost our boy rottie, Oakley, to cancer not too long ago and we already had what some might call a small petting zoo (turtles, birds, a chicken, and Rayban our 11 year old female Rottweiler). However, Shotzie's story hit me right away and was close to my heart. Six years ago my fiancé at the time died suddenly in an accident at work. I couldn't afford a house on my own and couldn't find an apartment to take in 2 huge rottweilers so I had to give up my lifetime companions Rayban and Oakley. Luckily for me my father who lives in Arizona took them in and looked after them for 3 years until I was back on my feet and able to provide a home for them. It was the hardest thing to give them up and I am so lucky to have gotten the chance to have them back with me. I knew when the humane society volunteer Lynn Roach called me that this was my chance to give back and be there to provide a comfortable loving home for Shotzie.

Shotzie has fit into our lives so well, she is such a sweet, loving dog and now Rayban has a companion without feathers! I know this union was meant to be for all of us.

The Escondido Humane Society has announced the hiring of a new Staff Veterinarian.

Dr. Elizabeth Gibbs, DVM is a San Diego native who grew up in Del Mar and graduated from Torrey Pines High School. She attended UC Davis as an undergraduate and went to Veterinary School at Ross University on the island of St. Kitts in the Caribbean. After a year of clini-

cal training at the University of Illinois, her first job was a mixed animal care practice in Lake Havasu, Arizona. Two years of heat and a desire to be closer to her parents who still live in Del Mar made moving back to San Diego very appealing. She has spent the last 6 months doing relief and emergency veterinary work in the Northern San Diego area.

Music and Stress

Stress is a very big problem in the kennel environment. Stress is a major factor in weight loss, stress colitis, lowered immune systems and kennel syndrome.

But this very same stress can be found in the home environment. Some of the ways you can help are: provide toys, daily walks, training behaviors, (tricks, basic commands, advanced commands), daily brushing (grooming if enjoyed by the dog) and food toys.

Besides the dogs being walked every day, and trained three to four times a week, music will help lower the stress levels substantially. Carefully selected music can help the dogs relax.

Hard Rock, Rap and R & B can all raise the stress levels and cause increased pacing, jumping, vocalization, and in turn heighten stress levels. Classical Music however has been shown in case studies (Wells, Graham & Hepper published in Animal Welfare Vol. 11, No. 4) to cause the animals to rest more, vocalize less, and therefore reduce stress!

How about turning on a classical Station when you have a stressful or long day. It will help both of you relax. Or turn it on when you leave or set the radio on a timer. (This can be done inside or outside) I alternate between leaving the TV on one day and the stereo on the next. There are classical CD's made for dogs and cats alike

Along with rotating toys, walks, cars rides, training programs and music, you are doing the best you can to alleviate stress and boredom in your pet.



The Adoption Process

The adoption process begins with a visit to our facility. Our adoption hours of operation are Tuesday through Sunday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

When you come in, please put your name on our sign-in sheet and then you can take a look at the animals. Be sure to read the animal profiles on the kennels. Each animal has a profile which includes the name, sex, age, breed and a behavioral evaluation. If you find an animal that you are interested in, we will then ask you to fill out our pre-adoption questionnaire. After you have completed the questionnaire, one of our adoption counselors will take the animal out for you to interact with.

Requirements for Adoption:

- All members of the household, including young children must be present to ensure the chosen pet is compatible with everyone.
- If you are interested in adopting a dog and you have another dog in the household, the two dogs must meet to ensure they get along.
- If you rent, we must have the landlord's approval before adoption.

Please note that dogs accompanying you are not allowed in the adoptable animal viewing areas. We recommend you bring a family member or friend to hold your dog while you look around. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

The adoption fee for dogs includes: spaying or neutering, veterinary evaluation, vaccinations and microchipping - A one-year free dog license is included if you live in Escondido or San Marcos.

The adoption fee for cats includes spaying or neutering, veterinary evaluation, vaccinations, microchipping and feline leukemia testing.

If you find an animal you are interested in adopting but it is not currently available, we can give you a courtesy call the day before the animal becomes available. It is an advance notification, but it is not a hold. Once the animal becomes available, it is first come, first served.

"If you can't take it with you, it's important that you leave it in all the right places."

You will learn how to approach an injured animal, muscle and bone injuries, wound care, medical emergencies, dog and cat CPR and more. Sue Lockhart is our lead Pet First Aid instructor. She trained as a puppy raiser for Guide Dogs for the Blind and worked with them for 8 years and she has taught Pet First Aid since 1997. Book and certificate of completion included (no expiration).

Doggies Dash And Raise Cash



The 6th Annual Doggie Dash 5K Run/Walk, which took place on March 13 at Kit Carson Park, raised over \$54,000 for the Escondido Humane Society. The number of participants in all three events increased from about 600 last year to over 1,000 in 2005.

Christine Russo of FOX 6, who along with My 94.1, were the lead media sponsors, presented the awards. "Christine really did a great job. She really knows how to relate to

a crowd," said Phil Morgan, CEO of the Escondido Humane Society. "We were grateful to have such strong media sponsors to help us get the word out."

Other major sponsors were Miramar Kitchen & Bath and Westfield Shoppingtown North County. Additional sponsors included Acacia Animal Hospital, Cindy Waasdorp of Coldwell Banker, First Pacific Bank, PETCO and the PETCO Foundation. Dalton's Roadhouse of San Marcos provided the breakfast.

The largest individual fundraiser was once again Cindy Curtain of Escondido, bringing in pledges of \$3,785. She has been the #1 contributor for each of the six years the Doggie Dash has been run.

Runners and walkers participated in a competitive 5K Run without dogs, a 5K Run with their pet and a One-Mile Fun Run/Walk with or without their four-legged friend.

"This event is so much fun and helps to raise the dollars we need to help animals,"




said Cindy Waasdorp, Escondido Humane Society Board Member. "It's great to see that the event is growing each year!"


